COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course will provide you with an overview of world theatre history and practice. Readings will cover aspects of production such as acting, directing, design, and playwriting, as they are practiced throughout the world. We will examine how theatre traditions have been



created, as well as how they have adapted, especially in our contemporary global community.

In this course, we will pursue some fundamental questions: What is theatre? Why and how do artists make theatre? Why and how do we attend and study theatre? How does theatre influence, shape, transform, and enrich our identities? How is theatre influential in the shaping of our culture, and how does our culture shape our theatre?

You will work as both theatre practitioners and theatre scholars. You will act as theatre critics, seeing and analyzing four live performance events. You will act as directors, performers, dramaturgs, or designers, forging your own creative processes and presenting your work in front of the class. As theatre scholars, you will be responsible for the readings/viewings and take two in-class exams—exercises that give you an opportunity to think critically about the material we cover throughout the semester.

QUIZZES (225 points*)

Quizzes will be delivered through **I-Clicker** questions given during class as well as through in-class exercises. The quizzes will cover assigned reading and viewings. Quizzes will be calculated out of a cumulative of 225 points. There will be 20 quizzes during the semester worth 15 points each. If you do not miss any quizzes and receive a 100 percent on each you will receive 75 points extra credit.

Due to this policy there will be no make-up quizzes.



EXAMS (225 points)

Exams will be given once during middle of the term and also during the scheduled day of finals. The Mid-Term exam will consist of all material covered up until that date. The Final Exam will cover material from the entire semester with 3/4 of the exam being new material and 1/4 being review from the Mid-Term exam. The exam format will be a combination of True/False, Fill in the Blank, and Short Essay questions.

If you have a verified and excusable conflict for the Mid-Term exam, you must make arrangements no less than 14 days prior to the exam. The state of Colorado requires we have a scheduled class during the Final exam period. Due to this policy, there will be no accommodations made for taking the test at another date or time. 
PERFORMANCE RESPONSE PAPERS (300 points)

Performance response papers will be assigned for three University of Colorado Department of Theatre and Dance productions plus one performance of your choosing. There will be a list of acceptable performances given for the additional performance. If you would like to see a performance not on the approved list please discuss with your instructor to receive permission. The purpose of these papers is to encourage theatre spectatorship while helping the student develop an eye and vocabulary for understanding and describing theatrical performances. All Performance Response Papers



will be due at 11:59 PM the night of the last performance. If the last performance is at 2pm on a Sunday the paper is due at 11:59 PM that evening. There will be an 2 pt deduction for every hour late up until the class period the the following day. We will discuss the production during the class period following the last performance and therefore no papers will be accepted after this class. Papers must be submitted via D2L dropbox in Word (doc / docx) format on the assigned date. Ticket from show required.

The Paper for this performance will be a 750 word critical and analytical response. We will go over the guidelines for this paper in class as well as being listed on D2L.

Additional Performance Response (50 points)

Performance of your choice that can consist of Theatre, Dance, Multimedia, Performance Art, etc.

The Paper for this performance will be a 400 word response in the style of your choosing following the guidelines given for the three previous papers. Consult the guidelines before attending your performance so you are able to take the appropriate notes. This paper is may not be submitted before February 6th.

All Papers must adhere to most Current MLA guidelines for formatting and citations. A 10% reduction in grade will occur for any MLA errors.

IN CLASS ACTIVITIES (55 points)


To truly experience the various elements of the theatre one should do more than just study its facts and figures. We will engage in several creative activities which will allow you to get a taste of what it is like to write a play, design a set or costume, act and even direct. These activities will take place primarily within the class period. Some of the experiences will take only 10 minutes while others will use the entire class period and they will be a combination of individual and small group efforts.

IN CLASS PARTICIPATION (70 points)

Your opinions and reactions to the material and ideas we encounter are very important and should be shared. To get the most out of this course it is essential that you come prepared and ready to engage in discussion with your fellow classmates. Always bring questions and responses to the material you have read with you to each class and be prepared to share them. Part of your grade is dependent on your discussion participation. For certain discussion days groups may be assigned to lead discussion on readings and viewings. You may also be asked to read parts from the play we read for that day.

PLAYWRITING (75 points)

You will be assigned a group in which all of you will write, stage, rehearse and perform a short play of approximately 5 minutes. All of the group members must contribute to the creation of the performed piece as either actor, director, designer and/or playwright. You may use props and small set pieces if you wish. Your group will be given time to rehearse during specifically scheduled class times and you will be expected to schedule a minimum of 3 additional hours outside of class. Your grade will be determined by points calculated from a combination of contribution to the overall project, professionalism and dedication to the final performance. Each member of the group will be required to submit a 250 word response of their individual contribution to the project.



GROUP PRESENTATION (50 points)

During the three days of this course, you will have the opportunity to get together with five or six other students from this class to present on a topic chosen from a list provided. Your group will be asked to research, prepare and present a 10-minute presentation on the topic selected. Your presentation should be exciting, dynamic and informative and involve the whole group. You may use visuals such as slides and up to 4 minutes of video, which you should narrate.

EXTRA CREDIT **(35 points possible)

You will be given the option of attain extra credit in a multitude of ways. You may write a 250 word personal reflection on each full length play in the *Angels in America* series. A rubric for this assignment will be given during the semester. You may also achieve additional credit for other theatrical related activities. Verification of activities are proven through documentation and discussion with the Instructor or TA in office hours. Discuss with the Instructor to see what is best for you individually. The purpose of extra credit is to encourage involvement in theatrical activities and improving your theatrical literacy.

Examples Include.:

Attending an additional theatrical performance.

Volunteering time to help work on a theatrical performance in any capacity.

Auditioning for a live theatrical event.

ATTENDANCE

A vital part of the experience of this course takes place in the classroom. There will be no opportunities to make-up for any of the events you might miss in class should you be absent, including discussions, presentations, quizzes, and in class participation and activities. Because you have the ability to attain extra credit on the cumulative quiz grade the undergraduate policy on attendance is fully complied to.
